

Jerry Pollotta, LESIG Keynote Speaker

Jerry Pollotta was well-received by the LESIG audience at the 2018 ILA Conference held in Austin last July. Jerry's presentation helped would-be authors to see that simple life experiences can be used as a springboard for telling a story that children need to hear. Such is the case with the many ocean-themed alphabet books he has to his credit as they reflect his childhood experiences of living on the East Coast where he was intrigued by the ocean and its animals. His stories behind the stories were especially interesting as audience members discovered when he took them on a "scavenger hunt" to find the sundry references to The Beatles and their song lyrics within *The* Beetle Alphabet Book. Anyone who has read a book over and over to a child will likely have an appreciation for a book that both educates and entertains a child while, at the same time, keeps the adult reader on their toes as they look for the adult humor/interests that Jerry weaves into his texts and illustrations. Jerry is quite generous and showed this through giving away many books and taking the time to individualize the inscriptions in each.

Language Experience Approach Explained

The Language Experience Approach (LEA) is based on the following ideas: that the learner is an active user of language, learning is promoted through personal involvement, and communication of meaning is the purpose of language learning. Another important aspect is that the learner's products are valued and are valid materials to be utilized for literacy learning (Landis, Umolu & Mancha, 2010).

The steps followed in the LEA procedure are as follows:

- 1. The student composes a story (based upon their own experience or upon a book as a stimulus) and dictates her story to the teacher.
- 2. The teacher reads the student's story to check if the written dictation was correct.
- 3. The student's draft is completed and the student reads his/her story to the teacher.
- 4. Any words that the student has difficulty identifying can become part of a word bank for the student.
- 5. The story could then be printed and reread again by the student or by the other students in the class.

An example of an LEA story composed by a struggling middle school student who recalled being on a hunting trip can be found in Figure 1. Included are the words in the Word Bank that the student miscued when he orally read the story to the teacher. The student practiced the Word Bank so that the listed words will become part of his sight vocabulary.

A great asset of LEA is that the student's reading vocabulary, which is derived from his oral vocabulary, allows for acquisition of sight words, as well as natural semantic and grammatical structures (Ward, 2005). The Language Experience Approach is a total language arts approach that relies heavily upon dictated stories, word banks, and creative writing. Therefore, LEA is also a very

comprehensive methodology that can be used to teach literacy.

Hunting With My Cousin By B.R.

When I was nine or ten my dad, brother, cousin, and I were hunting with a bow. My cousin, Wes, was sitting in my dad's tree stand. A tree stand is a platform that you stand on up in a tree. My dad and I were driving the woods out. This is when you walk through the woods and spook the deer out. My dad told me to stand at a big tree and two doe came past the tree. A little later a six-point buck came right up about 10 yards away from me. Then I spooked it right to my cousin, Wes. He shot it through the lungs. It ran about 50 yards and died.

When we got to the stand, Wes said that two doe came right by him and then he turned around and he saw an eight point and he spooked it when he turned around. Then the six-pointer came 27 yards away and he shot it after he saw the other deer.


